Learning Focus

This month, our learning focus continues to be on preparing for and completing assessment tasks. By now, most students have either completed or are close to completing at least one assessment in most subjects. Our Professional Learning Teams are concentrating on enhancing our collaborative abilities to better differentiate instruction. Topics covered include grouping in mixed-ability classrooms, providing explicit instruction for advanced students, the gradual release model of teaching, and multiple exposures to concepts.

Teacher Professional Practice Day Wednesday, August 21

In accordance with the VGSA, staff accessed their professional practice day on August 21. This pupil-free day was dedicated to planning, preparing, assessing student learning, collaborating, developing the curriculum, engaging in relevant professional development, and participating in peer observations with feedback and reflection.

Dear parents and carers,

In Term 4, 2024, families with a child enrolled in a government school from Prep to Year 12 in 2025 will receive the one-off \$400 School Saving Bonus, per child

The \$400 School Saving Bonus provides families with support for education-related costs, such as school activities and/or school uniforms and textbooks. The School Saving Bonus is not available for full-fee international students, home schooled students, TAFE students and students attending kindergarten in 2025.

Actions for parents and carers

Before 18 October 2024, the Department of Education is asking parents and carers to:

- Complete enrolment: If your child, or children are changing government school for Term 1 2025, or starting Prep or Year 7 in 2025. All Year 7 enrolments for Ringwood Secondary College in 2025 should be finalised and returned to the College.
- Check your contact information: Ensure your email address and phone number is up to date with us.
 You can check this information on your Compass Parent Portal. If changes are required, contact the school directly.

We need to ensure your contact information is up to date as the Department of Education will email you twice:

- in October, to verify your email address
- in November, with your \$400 School Saving Bonus.

Please check your junk mail regularly to make sure you do not miss an important email.

ASSISTANT PRINCIPALS

Year 12

We wish the Year 12 students all the very best as they begin the final stage of their secondary school studies.

Our Year 12 VCE Vocational Major (VM) students are busily completing their literacy, numeracy, work related skills, personal development skills, and Vocational Education and Training (VET) assessment tasks to complete their studies by early Term 4. Our VCE students are gearing up for the beginning of exams with the Performance Studies and Language Oral exams beginning on 7 October and the written exams beginning with English on 29 October.



For the Year 12 students completing exams in Term 4, it is imperative that they continue their study habits and study routine during the upcoming Term 3 school break to consolidate their knowledge and skills in preparation for the exams. The students must review the key knowledge and key skills of the outcomes studied this year, with a particular focus on the areas they found more challenging and need more practice on.

VCE Vocational Major (VM)- 2025

The VCE Vocational Major (VM) is a vocational and applied learning program within the VCE. The VCE VM provides students interested in applied learning with the opportunity to pursue their strengths and interests and to develop the skills and capabilities needed to succeed in further education, work and life. It aims to prepare students to move into apprenticeships, traineeships, further education and training, university (via non-ATAR pathways) or directly into the workforce.

The College has undertaken a review of the VCE VM program this year to ensure we develop the course to meet best practice principles. In 2025, students will attend three full days of school a week, attend one day of Vocational Educational and Training (VET), and complete one day of compulsory Structured Workplace Learning in industry. The college will continue to support students to undertake School-based Apprenticeships and Traineeships (SBATs).

School-based Apprenticeships and Traineeships (SBATs)

It was great to attend an information session on Monday 26 August with 17 interested Year 11 and 12 VCE VM students on School-based Apprenticeships and Traineeships (SBATs). The information session was conducted by the organisation Head Start. Head Start is a program that supports students to participate in a SBAT to develop skills, capabilities and confidence with employers in growth industries. A SBAT is an employment-based learning pathway that combines completion of secondary school with part-time paid employment and training.


Our students in earlier year levels are always urged to use their attention in class and creation of home study habits as strategies to build their learning confidence and abilities.

Parent Connect evening

On 13th of August in the beautiful Yanna Mudjirr ('Stepping Stones') Senior School building, a group of parents joined a conversation about how to build effective study skills.

Led ably by Jenn Collier and Jim Norman, the presentation explored how our brains are continually re-forming and re-crafting neural connections, how to activate memory more effectively and the group shared strategies to combat procrastination and screen fixations.

From the feedback collected by Jason Kilby, families enjoyed the practical discussion and also provided ideas for the next Parent Connect in Term 4 that will focus on cyber safety.

Updates to the Victorian Curriculum

The familiarisation process for the new curriculum continues in August and September with 21 webinars for staff to explore as they compare the new curriculum with the previous iteration. The new curriculum seeks to create clearer connections from one level to the next so that learning growth will be more readily observable.

The 3 cross curriculum priorities of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander histories and cultures, engagement with Asia and sustainability continue, but with new organising ideas. The introduction of 3 foundational skills: digital literacy, literacy and numeracy, are designed to help clearer engagement with other curriculum areas to build our students into more confident 21st century global citizens.

For the teachers, the Victorian Curriculum 2.0 means a revision of all curriculum and the way that we assess against the required achievement standards. In this work, the teaching team continues to explore creative ways of making engaging, accessible and diverse learning experiences.

The challenges of Al

The Curriculum Committee is currently exploring ways to reinforce the importance of human knowledge and to use AI as a support to learning. It is essential that our assessment experiences can accurately gauge what students can do so that appropriate learning can fill any gaps to support on-going learning. If AI is used to do the work, it can rob the learning experience from the students and leave them unable to really understand ideas or to develop life-long thinking strategies. This 21st century challenge is a curly one, but this team is adamant that with creativity and persistence, they will find better ways to use AI judiciously and support students in that exploration too.

Focus on positive learning behaviours: showing persistence and resilience

The recent Olympics festival is often seen as a celebration of achievement, but it is so much more than that: it reminds us what persistence and resilience can do. People may have outrageous talent, but the persistence to use that talent and make it more powerful is the essence of the Olympics and is the essence of our school value of achievement. In classrooms every lesson every day, students can develop and strengthen their own persistence and resilience in some practical ways:

- Asking good questions such as "does that connect to last week's assignment because of ..." or "I understand this part but does that section mean..."
- Before asking for help, see if re-reading or reviewing the previous step opens up your understanding
- Focus on what you can do first and use it to step into the more challenging parts
- Smile at yourself when you try and it doesn't work

As always, teachers are working with students to help them learn about their own strengths and to push a bit harder so that learning can grow.

What is the Heritage Perpetual Scholarship?

- The Heritage and Alumni Perpetual Scholarship is a monetary award to support selected student/s to undertake their Year 11 and/or 12 studies in 2025
- This scholarship is directed toward someone who is overcoming disadvantage of some form, whilst demonstrating positive attributes and/or participation in school activities. This disadvantage may be, but is not limited to, financial, cultural, home situation, physical or intellectual disability.
- Up to 10 scholarships to the value of \$500 each, may be awarded annually by the Heritage and Alumni Group to offset educational costs for the successful applicatnts.
- The scholarship is a non transferable cash payment that can be spent over 1 or 2 years on any RSC educational expense for a student undertaking Year 11 and/or 12 at the College.

Who may apply?

Students in either Year 10 or Year 11 at RSC in 2024

How do I apply?

- It may be helpful to talk to a relevant staff member before starting the process. Parental or guardian approval is required.


